

Overview of Book's Structure

The book reads similar to a textbook. Its chapters are broken down by section headers. They are either several font sizes larger and bold, or they are slightly larger in a different font. Either posing a question or in a sentence summarizing the paragraphs ahead. Making it easier to go back to recall an idea or a citation.

Highlights

The "Steps to Higher Ground" at the end of chapters is unique in a couple ways. Summarizing a chapter of the book to a presentable short read helps drive her ideas to the reader. Because of the way they're summarized. These sections of the book can be a way to reference, as a Project Manager, how to structure stakeholder strategies.

What's New in This Book

Honesty. Maybe there isn't anything new in this book, but it's message is clear. It takes more to build an ethical company beyond following sustainability, the ESG, and legal compliance. Feedback loops must be worked and created between internal culture and external impact. Human rights, checks and balances against corruption, working with other companies. Doing the work to understand these topics can help create structure in making a positive impact.

Who might benefit from the Book?

All project managers can benefit from having this in their library. I would include business leadership and entrepreneurs as well. "Stakeholder" is a complicated topic and having a book like this to remind us who those are is important in improving an ethical business environment.

Conclusion

Alison Taylor's perspective is an advanced approach of looking at a key aspect for Project Managers. Understanding how important Stakeholders are in a project is essential, but it's not always clear how to prioritize and manage Stakeholders outside of the PMP exam.
