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This month in the Journal

One **Peer Reviewed Paper** was approved for publication this month. Congratulations to **Rishiraj Kohli** on publication of his interesting research paper titled "The Evolution of the PMO: Comparing Traditional vs Al-Enhanced Project Management Offices." Through our new peer review program, we are offering PhD candidates such as Mr. Kohli the opportunity to learn the publishing process, improve writing and presentation skills, and obtain the approval of an experienced academic reviewer or two.

Nine **Featured Papers** are included this month, by authors in six different countries. These conference-quality papers represent a mix of academic and professional research by professors, graduate students and very senior project management practitioners. The topics vary from directly to indirectly related to program and project management. Rather than mention all of the titles and authors, I can say that these are substantial works representing many hours of research and writing. Some of them represent research into topics of high interest to local industries and/or stakeholders, which is significant. If we have a few readers in specific locations who can benefit from reading the PMWJ, that's great. Please review the titles and summaries and read one or two. Several are a little long, several fascinating and a couple on significant topics.

Three **Series Articles** are included by authors in three different countries. **Oliver Lehmann** in Germany has authored the next article in his very interesting series on "Project Business", this one titled "Decision Inertia". **Dr. Hugo Minney** in England is back with a powerful new article titled "Building Stronger Communities Through Projects: Social Value as a Strategic Driver of Organisational Success" in his series on "Sustainability and Regeneration in Projects". "Reinventing Project Management" is a new series begun this month and continuing in 2026 by the globally-recognized expert on the project economy, **Mr. Antonio Nieto-Rodgriguez**, who is based in Spain. Antonio's introductory article this month is titled "Reimagining Project Management for a New Era". Don't miss reading our series articles, which are often enlightening and entertaining, and always informative.

Seven Advisory Articles are included this month, by authors in seven different countries. APM Fellow Tom Taylor in the UK has authored an interesting and perhaps humorous piece titled "Dealing with Jargon – for managers in the built environment." Dr Colin Darrington Prince in South Africa is the author of "The Art of War and the Discipline of Project Management: Ancient Strategy for Modern Execution". Kumar Sarma in the UAE has shared his experience in "Eight Pillars of Project Management Excellence: An Educators Guide to Purpose, Resilience, and Growth". Yogi Schulz in Canada has returned with "Project outcomes depend on the project manager's collaboration with the project sponsor", a topic he literally wrote the book on. Experienced executive advisor in Portland, Oregon Jeff Oltmann is back with a useful article titled "Why Teams Need Systems to Thrive". Regular contributor Dr. Ken Smith in Manila has authored "Given Several Extant Averages; Which is Best for Your Business?". And the prolific team of Dr. Harold Kerzner and Dr. Al Zeitoun have contributed a new advisory titled "The Impact of EGOs on Project Management", an article that should be widely appreciated since we've all experienced this very common condition.

Two **Commentary Articles** are also included this month. **Dr. Dimitris Antoniadis** in the UK has authored "How do integrated structures and software tools support the management of the effects of project complexity?" **Muhamed Abdomerovic** in North Carolina, USA is the author of "Project Management Body of Knowledge (PMBOK) Next Stage: In search of 'purposeful views and contents'". We are delighted to have **Alan Stretton**, who celebrated his 95th birthday last month after relocating from Australia to New Zealand and who is widely recognized as a true pioneer in the PM field, back with another **Personal Story** this month. Five **Reports** have been submitted by authors in five different countries this month. Alessandro has provided full coverage of ISIPM's big PMexpo conference in October, complete with great photos of many presenters and attendees.
